The Steps

Line 1: first name/nickname of the person Line 2: 4 adjectives that describe the person Line 3: X of Y formula, describing an important **relationship** to the person Line 4: 3 things s/he loves Line 5: 3 things s/he fears Line 6: 3 things s/he wants to see Line 7: resident of...+ place/time/concept Line 8: last name of the person

YA Example*

Rebel Individualistic, artistic, snarky, honest Free-spirited daughter of an adventurous mother Loves art, going barefoot, "freedom to be me" Fears being ordinary, giving her heart to Nate, being disloyal to her mom Wants to see art school, the world on the back of a scooter, family (unrealized) A barefoot girl in a world that wears shoes Blue
